He spent two years in his first teaching post as a secondary school English language teacher in the agricultural province of Casamance.

Then he was appointed local coordinator of a distance learning operation launched by the British Senegalese Institute for the teaching of English which targeted adults and school drop-outs In 1984, his essay; MY IDEA OF AN IDEAL ENGLISH TEXTBOOK FOR WEST AFRICAN FRANCOPHONE COUNTRIES won a national prize.

He enjoyed a period in the UK and in the USA, as part of a British Council sponsored summer course at Exeter University (July 1985) and of a USIA- sponsored African Educators Program at Northern Arizona University Flagstaff (July 1990).

He has also worked as a camp counsellor at international summer camps for children.

He became physically disabled in January 1997.

ALIOU has always struck me as someone fond of Education and Peace - or Peace through Education. He is physically disabled today, but this is no obstacle to his ambition to help promote a better, violence free, world. A world where, whatever their disability or lack of it, people can lead a meaningful life. He deserves more opportunities for further knowledge and skills, as he is eager to pursue graduate studies on Education for Peace. I am sure that this would enable him to honour his own commitment to contribute to the development of Education, especially Peace and Environmental Education for children in Senegal and beyond.
